The world number two female tennis player Naomi Osaka has withdrawn from the French Open tennis tournament after deciding not to take part in interviews after one of her matches.

All players in the tournament are expected to be interviewed after their matches but Naomi has said previously that she finds interviews difficult.

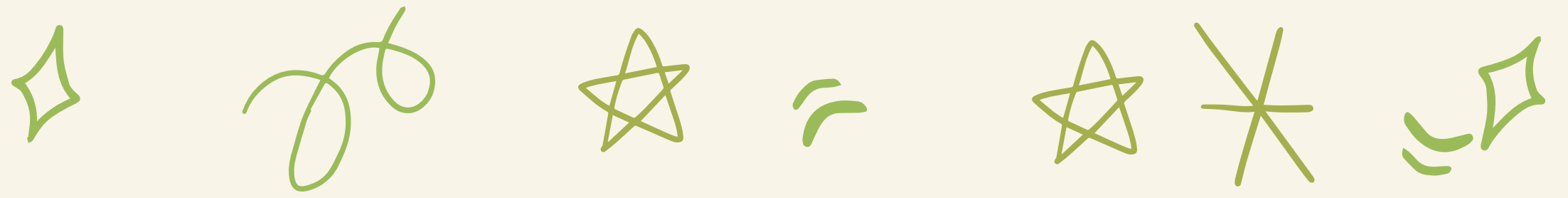

Examples of public speaking

- The Queen rarely speaks to the public but she does deliver a speech every year on Christmas day and she is also required to deliver a speech at the State Opening of Parliament.
- People who are involved in sales often need to speak to an audience to share the product they are hoping to sell.
- A tour guide speaks to an audience as they share information about a particular place or landmark.
- Events that are organised in your local community such as a fun run or a fair often feature the organiser speaking to the people who attend. They may be sharing information, thanking people or celebrating the event.
- Politicians need public speaking skills to deliver engaging speeches and take part in debates.
- A broadcast journalist researches and presents news stories through TV, Radio or the internet.
- Teachers and lecturers speak to large groups of pupils, parents and staff.
- Some people are paid as public speakers to inspire and motivate others e.g. a group of people who all work together.

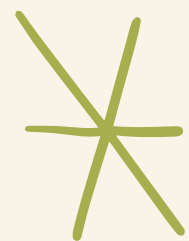

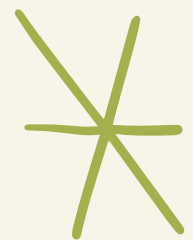
